authors Michelle
Cliff, Maryse
Conde, and Dionne
Brand address the
silences and gaps
of historiography
by fleshing out

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overlooked historical figures in literary form. These authors do not simply reconstruct lost lives, but rather they foreground the tension between the real, material traces of people's lives and the fact of their erasure. In novels that are at

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once historical, biographical, and artistic, they portray real but sparsely documented and therefore haunting histories through a strategy identifiable as "ghostwriting." Erica L. Johnson defines ghostwriting as an

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important genre of

literature through
which authors
literally ghostwrite
stories for lost
historical figures
even while they
poetically preserve
the unspeakable
nature of the
archival lacunae
their novels
engage. Erica L.

Wagner College.
