Lekha Dodi is a Hebrew-language Jewish liturgical song recited Friday at dusk, usually at sundown, in synagogue to welcome Shabbat prior to the evening services. It is part of the Kabbalat Shabbat. Lekhah Dodi means "come my beloved," and is a request of a mysterious "beloved" that could mean either God or one's friend to join together in welcoming Shabbat that is referred to as the "bride"; likrat kallah. During the singing of the last verse, the entire congregation rises and turns to the west
